n a Monday morning in March 2020, when the South African government announced that schools would be shutting down, many learners across the country - and we're sure even at the Union Schools - cheered. "Corona-cation!"

The editors of the yearbook gulped.

We were barely at the starting line of a memory-making marathon, the chronicling of one year in the life of the School. We had hundreds of pages to fill, all of which would have been devoted to a year of sports, cultural activities and academics - which had just been cancelled, too. COVID-19 was a huge curve ball. And, school yearbooks aren't really built for curve balls. Ours is a well-oiled machine of school news, page-design templates and deadlines carefully staggered throughout the year for the orderly creation of books that typically run about 200 pages.

When the virus threw its wrench into the gears, our school yearbook

When they decided to become educators, they couldn't have anticipated upending their years of training to reinvent the teaching practices that they'd adopted and honed. The transition was abrupt, unclear, and uncharted. Pivoting into a digital classroom meant they had to think and learn quickly. And they delivered with grace and grit. In a short amount of time, they adapted curricula to new teaching platforms and tools that they previously had no experience using. They taught lessons during the day, making sure to also form personal connections with each young face so they felt seen and supported. But their unwavering contributions continued into the late evenings, behind the scenes. Whether spending countless hours learning innovative teaching techniques, ensuring that every learner has access to the curriculum, troubleshooting digital tools for families of varying technical literacy, or taking parent-teacher calls into the evening hours to share their learners' progress, they went above and beyond.

Our families and learners have had their share of challenges in this new normal, some of whom also struggled to adapt to a virtual learning environment. As educators, our staff experienced a unique set of challenges. These challenges included drops in attendance and learner engagement, difficulty observing learners' learning efficacy, fewer opportunities to build a classroom community, managing learners' behaviour from behind a screen, or a combination of these and more.

They reinvented what learning means and looks like, and their journey wasn't without hardship and frustration along the way. In addition to rising in support of the learners and their families, they had to balance their personal life in the process. Educators were managing their own mental health and as many are parents themselves, they had to

fell by the wayside. As the School is a cornerstone of its community, the focus immediately fell on coordinating education and safety recommendations. Raising much-needed funds. Deciphering the news and working with the Department of Education to set policy and procedures at the school. We saw teachers trying to self-quarantine their own families, while also preparing remote lesson plans and packets which could be distributed to parents who are trying to keep their children occupied and educated.

Now, almost three years later, having emerged from the devastation that was COVID-19, we're back to preserving our memories and celebrating a year full of friends, events and shared experiences. HEADMASTER'S REPORT



222 has been a very busy, constructive year for our school in its 103rd year. It would, however, be difficult for me to report on this year without placing it in the context of the school that we have had since President Ramaphosa announced a 21-day lockdown which began on Thursday 26 March 2020 and was to have concluded on 16 April of that year. Of course, the lockdown was far longer than 21 days, and turned our lives and the education of our children upside-down.

It was certainly a challenging

time for us all, and brought significant changes to how the school and the boarding houses, in particular, were compelled to run. I should like to thank our parent body for their continued support during this time, and for assisting their children to continue with their education while they were at home.

The educator staff were forced to adapt and evolve very quickly, and without warning, and rose to the challenge, learning online teaching and new methods of communication very quickly. Much of the technology that we have been introducing to our school over the last decade proved critical to the fact that we were able to continue teaching effectively during this time.

Perhaps the most significant changes occurred in our boarding houses, with Herby Arnott House becoming a junior co-educational house, and Arthur Kingwill house the senior co-educational house. While this has been received with mixed response, it is the model that works best for our school currently.

On top of all of this, we had to contend with a disputed School Governing Body election, which ended up in litigation in the Grahamstown High Court and put enormous pressure on the management of the school, which essentially operated without an SGB for some months. Beyond the practical disruptions, I believe that this was not good for our school and community at all, and it is certainly not something that should ever happen again. Many lessons were learned by all parties through this unfortunate event.

Load shedding, the sharp rise in living costs and fear and anxiety in a general sense all have contributed to a highly-stressed society in which we live, and this too has impacted on how people respond to the slightest incident or provocation.

The school that we returned to in 2022 was vastly different to the school that we had, had up to 2019, and so were the learners and staff. It took a great deal of effort and motivation to get the rusty wheels of this huge machine to turn smoothly again. Change is good, and the school needed to take the opportunity provided by this new beginning to do things differently. 2022 has been a year of rebirth re-imagining and evolution.

They also learn that no matter how difficult and painful things can be sometimes, giving up is not an option, and each participant is extremely proud to complete the 5-day challenge. Odyssey could not happen without the love and generosity of so many who give so much to make it a success and we are very grateful to all of our parents who make this a reality each year.

Each year, more and more outdoor activity and excursions are added to our calendar and we are grateful to our staff who buy into this ethos and provide such meaningful opportunities for educational growth on these excursions.

GROUNDS AND BUILDINGS

Today, based on the multi-cultural, multi-ethnic, multi-racial and multilingual composition of the learners at the school, it was widely felt that this flag no longer had a place in our school badge, and should be replaced by the South African flag. We trust that this significant change will provide a unifying symbol for the school's diverse learner population, for the school community and for the Graaff-Reinet community as a whole.

And so our school is looking forward to 2023, with a new badge, with hope in our hearts and with a love for the children in our care. While a new year always brings about an opportunity for a fresh start in those areas where this is necessary, it also brings with it opportunities for reflection and reminders of the greatness of this school and the richness of its history.

Some changes are due to take place within our staffing situation and we trust that we will be able to fill our vacancies with people who will contribute positively to our school. One or two internal staff moves also have the potential to lead to fresh enthusiasm and to improved teaching and administration. Sporting matters and general learner participation are also very much a part of our plans for 2023. In addition, our Governing Body is making a point of exercising positive leadership towards ensuring that 2023 is an even better year than 2022 and that we will move further ahead. GRADE 12 RESULTS 2021

he Class of 2021 achieved a 100% matric pass rate, with 80% of the matrics bagging Bachelor passes and the other 20%, Diploma passes. These results placed the School first in the Dr Beyers Naudé Local Municipality. Our school was also one of only 38 (out of the Eastern Cape's 941 schools) that achieved a 100% pass rate, placing us in the top four percent in the province.

Our top performer, James Rose-Innes - who achieved seven distinctions - was also acknowledged as Graaff-Reinet's top matric learner, a title he shared with Volkskool's Petroné Fourie. In total, the class achieved 59 subject distinctions.

We are incredibly proud of how adaptable and resilient the School's learners and staff have been through the difficult times since the start of COVID-19, particularly the 2021 Grade 12s, who have spent their toughest school years studying in pandemic restrictions. In light of this, a 100% pass rate is quite remarkable. Not only does it speak to the dedication and quality of our teaching staff but also the work ethic and determination of our learners. As a school, we did everything in our power to protect the Grade 12s so their studies were not interrupted. If they can achieve

this kind of success during this historic time of the pandemic, they will certainly be successful in their future endeavours.




THE MATRIC CLASS 2020



RENOVATIONS AND BUILDINGS

Outdoor Classroom

The learners returned at the start of the year with an enhanced educational locale – an outdoor classroom. The idea was conceptualised by the SGB during 2021, and, thanks to a generous sponsor, was completed at the start of 2022.

The space is a new addition that highlights the advantages of outdoor learning and access to nature, both known to increase learner enthusiasm and as being beneficial to social, emotional and physical health. Located next to the Tony Burrell Union, the outdoor classroom features new flooring, elegant desks and an outdoor whiteboard on the side of the building to aid the teachers.

The classroom has proven a hit among learners and staff alike and is being utilised by classes from both the high school and middle school on a daily basis. This is the first of several such spaces planned for the campus over the next couple of years.

Swimming Pool

It has long been one of the school's ambitions to increase the length of the pool from its current length of 25 yards (22,84 metres) to that of a standard competition pool - 25 metres - and this year the Union Schools embarked on such a project.

Construction to have this accomplished commenced in June 2022 and was completed successfully at the start of the 2022/23 swimming season. The completion of this project means that the School will now be able to host formal swimming galas, which need to be contested in a 25-metre pool, and in so doing generate and allow for renewed commitment from our swimmers and coaches in order to take swimming to new heights.

The school extends a grateful word of thanks to Mr Justin Kingwill, who shouldered the responsibility of this massive endeavour, for all his efforts in this regard.

Science Laboratory

As the school's Physical Sciences classroom and laboratory was decades old, a project was initiated at the start of the year to create a classroom that was not only visually stimulating, but designed in such a way that learners will want to learn and where demonstrations and practicals can be done with ease. In October, at the start of Term 4, this dream was realised when the recently refurbished classroom was

unveiled to learners and staff, resulting in the School boasting possibly the most modern science classroom in the Eastern Cape.

The aim was to convey the study of chemistry and physics with as much enthusiasm as possible, this being so much easier with the right tools, technology and infrastructure. The new lab is now a visually stimulating high-tech space, where special emphasis can be placed on experimental learning, enriched by media and electronic support. It is a classroom space learners want to be in. It is light, embracing, crisp, and colourful. The space celebrates the spirit of science, the cobalt blue, the flame of the Bunsen burner, the array of the periodic table, and the endless chains of chemical compounds. It is geared perfectly for practical demonstration. This is further complimented by an interactive digital teaching screen with excellent audio features. This classroom has placed the School's teaching space at the edge of where education is going into an exciting future.

The feedback from learners and staff has been extremely positive and all are tremendously excited about this new addition to the school's campus. Thank you to Mr David Langmead, vice-chair of the SGB, who was the driving force behind this project.

New Classrooms

Construction of a three-classroom addition to the Middle School began this year and is expected to be completed at the start of the 2023 academic year. This exciting development, on the corner of Donkin and Caledon Street, provides 179 square metres in additional classroom space. The new building connects to the current Middle School and features modern classrooms, covered patios on the front and side of the building and contemporary breakout spaces.

While the overall design of the new building "fits in" with the existing historic setting, the actual classrooms consist of innovative learning spaces that align with the pedagogical vision of the 21st century. These spaces are beautiful, light and airy, fitted with the latest technology and make learners feel good to be at school.

These innovative classrooms will not only provide greater opportunities for our current learners and teaching staff, but it will also allow us to adapt and expand our educational offering in order to support the growth and development of the School as an educational institution. This new development is part of a 5-year development plan which will see all learning spaces at the School modernised and revitalised.

Here, the learners explored the caves of the San and Khoi people and learned many interesting things from Mr Henry Witbooi, their guide. They saw old rock art, while learning all about the differences between the San and Khoi rock paintings. They learned that the area was once a great inland lake and they viewed many specimens of pre-dinosaur time fossils, on average about 280 million years old. These included fossils of carnivores, herbivores, insects, crawling creatures, fish and even plants. They were taught how fossils are formed over many years.

The children were then treated to a tasty lunch in the garden of the main farmstead.


Although the pandemic still proved a hindrance to this exchange in 2021 and 2022, we are delighted that it will once again



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
GRADE 8 ORIENTATION HIKE

KAROO EISTEDDFOD

The Arts have a vital role to play in nation building and the wellbeing of our people. LIBRARY AND MEDIA CENTRE



The importance of reading cannot be overstated. It develops the mind, imagination, creative potential, improves spelling and expands the vocabulary. At the School we have always believed that a good reading habit is a vital skill that all learners should possess and that it should be given rapt attention. This is true more so today than ever before with the imminent danger of losing reading habits in the era of information and communication technologies, where the use of social media sites is the order of the day.

The school library plays a pivotal role in creating a reading culture and supporting reading engagement throughout the school. The wellstocked library is open to learners every day, with Grade 5 to 10 learners having weekly library periods.

Award-winning titles for the library are sourced by way of the YALSA (Young Adult Library Services Association) book lists and ALA (American

Library Association) Young Adult Best Fiction lists. New books are ordered every term with every book being carefully reviewed to determine the appropriate age group for that specific title. The library stock is divided into four sections: Young adult, Teenage, Junior as well as a Quick Read section to encourage the not-so-eager readers to crack open a book. The collection is diligently controlled and managed by a team of library monitors and assistants.

To complement the library's services, the School also offers learners a fully-equipped media centre with state of the art facilities for technologybased experience and learning enhancements. Here, learners can use modern computer equipment, as well as the free Internet services provided to them - under supervision - to conduct their research during school time as well as in the afternoons.

TABLET TECHNOLOGY

or several years now, the School has increasingly sought new and exciting ways to incorporate technology into its classrooms, one of these being the introduction of tablet technology in 2016. This move has seen educators in our senior department systematically migrate from traditional, old-fashioned paper-based course materials to touch-screen device platforms. As tablet technology was introduced to Grade 8 learners in 2016 and was extended with this group of learners who reached Grade 12 in 2020, the School is fortunate to now have all Grade 8 to 12 learners working on tablets.

Tablet Technology allows teachers to create, manage and insert learning resources directly into learners' textbooks. They can insert images, videos, PDFs, text documents and flashcards. Learners gain access to personalized content, additional multimedia resources and standard curriculum material in a single location. The miEbooks application each of our learners' tablets are equipped with serves as an e-book reader. Each learner is given unique login details for the app that allows them to access their personal e-book library. The app enables learners to add notes to specific sections of a textbook, make highlights, add freehand sketches and generate automated summaries of highlighted text as well as generating double-sided flashcards for study purposes.

In addition to having been an invaluable tool during lockdown, Tablet Technology has solved some of the biggest 21st-century challenges in education for the School, by making learning visible, removing fragmentation and bridging the gap between traditional and cuttingedge teaching. It has allowed the school to simplify, enhance and improve

BRIGETTE OELOFSEN - BEST SENIOR SPEAKER 2022

ere I am. Name – Brigetté. Height – 1,64 m. Mass – 67 kg. A regular learner who is nearing the end of her school career at a public school in the little town of Graaff-Reinet. Actually, this time next year I am sure to be counting down the days to the start of prelims. It will be 28 days from this date next year. That's 672 hours before the worth of my education is tested completely.

As I face the reality of finally being free of secondary education I find myself contemplating just that. Education. MY education. When you're very young, it's easy to believe the ditties - the rhymes read to us by doting parents and grey-haired grannies, but now I'm having second thoughts. It followed her to school one day – that was against the rule. And here I am – honestly wondering why on earth the lamb followed her to school in the first place! Was it hoping to be educated? Nooo! NO! NO! Big Question: just how educated will I be when I walk through the gates of school for the last time? Heads or tails? Place your bets, ladies and gentlemen. Is our education really all that or simply...headucation? I wish to explore the disturbing reality of the nature of education, which in my opinion is largely headucation. If there happens to be anyone in the audience who labours in the education field, head for the hills because I'm afraid I'm going to be critical. I have to be. Here goes.

Recently I conducted a short survey where I asked a group of 20 matric learners the following questions: 1) Can you file taxes? 2) Are you aware of life policies? It did not surprise me at all that, with the exception of accounting learners, the majority could not file taxes. ECO-SCHOOLS

he COVID-19 pandemic, the ensuing lockdown and social restrictions which followed and became part of the 'new normal' caused changes and upheavals to our school programme and daily lives. Feelings of fear, anxiety, loneliness, feelings of isolation or of being disconnected were common to many people, and especially to children and young people as they navigated the strange times we found ourselves in.

Concerned about the emotional well-being of our learners, we developed a programme to monitor emotional health as our current Eco-Schools project.

This programme is two-fold. It makes use of a tool to measure the "Happiness Quotient" of each class, and a system of Mentorship.

The Mentors are chosen on merit from the Grade 11 and 12 classes. Each class in the school is assigned 2 mentors, whose role is to form a connection with learners as guides, friends, advisors and role-models. In this way, we intend to ensure that each child in the school feels noticed, connected and cared for within the Union 'family' of learners.

The 'Happiness' charts are filled in by all learners at various times throughout each term. The class teachers oversee this, and the Eco-reps in each class collect the data. Records are kept, and are available should intervention become necessary.

The well-being of every learner at the School is of vital importance to all of us. This project involves the whole school in a drive to take care of, and look out for every child.

ECO CLUB

The Eco Club, which consisted of mainly Grade 5s this year, has enjoyed a busy, interesting year. They started off with practical lessons on how to make three different kinds of knots and examples of using these knots in everyday life, rescue operations and first aid situations. Following this theme, they explored local medicinal plants, learning how to identify and use them. They then moved onto learning about herbs and their many uses. The learners sometimes went home with cuttings or potted plants. They learnt how to make a hanging plant container too. The Club then explored Karoo succulents and their many uses, particularly Spekboom. Leading on from this, they spoke about vegetables; how to grow and care for certain ones. A lesson on artichokes by Micha Murray was also on the agenda. They learned how to collect and store seeds, thus making a seed bank and also learned about the biggest seed bank in the world, Svalbard Global Seed Vault, which is situated 1300 kms beyond the Arctic Circle.

The club's knowledge would not be complete without exploring and



learning about soil and soil types, including composting and mulching. A number of these lessons included a practical element and visiting a local garden. A lesson about trees, especially the indigenous trees that are prolific at the School, was also included.

Animals were also a major focus and they began this theme learning

about various pets. These lessons were given by the learners themselves, who brought their pets along and shared interesting information, and also how to care for them. Two types of resident birds here at school, namely the weavers and swallows were studied. The locust plagues allowed the club to capitalize on those unusual events and learn as much as possible about locusts. Bats and bees were also fascinating subjects and an interesting lesson on snakes was presented by Clea Clark. Chanté Bezuidenhout entertained the club, telling us about her

passion - Gem Stones. The club learnt about weather, extreme weather and climate. Ecology, food webs and biomes were also touched on as the Club explored different plants and animals. An interesting outing to the Library Museum presented the club with the opportunity to increase our knowledge about fossils and rock art, as Mrs Kayster, curator of the Museums, shared her vast knowledge. All in all, the Eco Club has had a jam-packed year, focusing on the beautiful biome that surrounds our school.

by Max Wright, and focused on 'The Trolley Dilemma'. This inaugural meeting was attended by 12 learners on 9 March 2021.



Much time and dedication has been put into the Marimba bands and thanks must go to all the members. We look forward to many exciting ventures in the new year as the bands grows from strength to strength.





Since Mr Maree's arrival at the helm, his mission has been to create an



SGB Chairman's report for 2022

Please find below the speech delivered by Union Preparatory School's SGB Chairman, Mr Justin Kingwill, during the school's end-of-year assembly:

oday it gives me great pleasure to address you all on behalf of the SGB. We gather here to recognise, celebrate and acknowledge the talents and achievements of our young learners who have excelled in a wide variety of academic cultural and sporting activities offered by the school.

The SGB represents the voice of the parent body and is ultimately responsible for the Governance of the school through its mandate to dictate policy and oversee the multitude of facets making up the School in its entirety. Conrad Hilton once said *"Success seems to be connected with action. Successful people keep moving. They make mistakes but they don't quit."*

I believe this saying perfectly portrays the outlook and attitude of the members of our Governing body. We are certainly not shrouded in perfection but possess a driven desire to maintain and improve this wonderful little institution.

The 2022 academic year finally returned to normal after the upheaval caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. It was a great relief to have our lives returned to normality as well as regular school events taking place.

We kick started the year taking ownership of our new grade 4 classrooms. A huge effort was put in by all involved to ensure these wonderful facilities were ready for the grade 4 class of 2022. A huge thank you must be once again extended to Donovan Burger for taking the lead on this project and ensuring all went to plan. We are truly blessed to have this state of the art new facility on our campus.

The Governing bodies vision for the school, back in 2021, was to create intimate, quality teaching and learning for our young learners, this entailed structuring our various grades into three smaller classes ultimately resulting in a lower teacher to learner ratio. This equated to approximately one Educator to twenty learners on average and in some instances less. This model has proved very successful however its sustainability is being threatened due to financial constraints. We desperately need the support of our parents in this regard. The realisation and understanding needs to be conveyed as to the importance of paying School fees and the impact this will have on the SGB ability to sustain such wonderful initiatives.

Our post provisioning for 2022 consisted of 7 departmental posts. This included the Principal, HOD for foundation phase as well as 5 educator posts with the addition of an IsiXhosa Educator. Our SGB posts on the academic side included twelve posts comprising of eight educators three support educators and an aftercare assistant. We employed three new educators at the beginning of the year namely Ms Barnard (Grade 1), as well Ms Harris and Mrs van Deventer as the new grade 4 educators. It is with regret that I must inform you that Ms Barnard has resigned and will be finishing at the end of the year at UPS. I'd like to extend my gratitude to her for the service throughout the year and wish her well in her future endeavours. I'd also like to pay a huge thank you to Mrs Du Preeze whose contract will be ending with us at the end of the year. Mrs du Preeze has done a wonderful job in running the aftercare and managing the library.

I'd also like to express my sincere gratitude to all our educators and staff. You are entrusted with the huge responsibility of educating our children.

Aristotle once said "Those who educate children well are more to be honoured than they who produce them; for these only gave them life, those the art of living well."

We thank you for your hard work and dedication throughout the year. You are all greatly appreciated!!

I'd also like to extend a huge thank you to our support staff who are all employed by the SGB. This includes our secretary Mrs Greyling and General workers Mr Kitchu, Mr Mafeking, Mrs Willemsem and Mrs Melonie.

On the cultural side it was great to hear the sound of music in the corridors of UPS again and having our senior and junior choirs operating once more. This was something we all took for granted prior to COVID-19. It was also great to have our annual concert held again and witnessing the strength of our diversity on display. A huge thank you to Mrs Kingwill and Ms van der Merwe along with their team for making all this happen.

On the sporting front we employed Mr Rogers as an additional sports coach from the beginning of the year. Mr Rogers post was provisioned by the Old Unionites association and we are extremely thankful for their support in this regard. I wish to thank and commend Mr Rogers for his professional and dedicated approach he adopted in carrying out his coaching duties.

We also employed Mr Rautenbach as the new Head of Junior Sport at the beginning of May. His role was to ensure better coordination and communication in managing the Junior Sport program encompassing learners from Grade one to seven. The nature of our schools structure makes this a challenging job. Mr Rautenbach unfortunately resigned in the middle of October however I believe he made a positive impact on building our sports image in the short time he was here.

We approached Mr Calvin Beck from the High School to assist us in managing our sport curriculum for the remaining part of the year. I'd like to express my sincere gratitude to Mr Beck for his professionalism and friendly nature in taking on this role. He has done a fantastic job. I'd also like to make special mention of Mrs Alet Kingwill, who despite her already heavy workload, also assisted in this role.

It is our aim as an SGB to ensure our sport curriculum is tailored to be as inclusive as possible, meaning we want as many learners being afforded the opportunity to participate. Major Shortcomings we are aware of include a lack of coaches for our B teams particularly in Rugby and Cricket. Fixtures and participation of our C and D teams in Junior Hockey at varying age groups. These along with a number of other issues we have identified will be addressed and hopefully overcome in 2023.

To all our coaches. A huge thank you for your time and effort you put into coaching sport. A special thanks to the following parents who volunteered in assisting with sport coaching throughout the year. These include Natalie Davenport- swimming, Janine van Jaarsveld- Hockey, Robert Mills Mark Hudson and David De Wet- Rugby and Victor Watson -cricket

I was involved in assisting the High School with the extension of the UHS swimming pool. The project entailed lengthening the pool from 22,86m (25 yards) to the standard Length of 25m. It appears this project has been a success and I look forward to our swimmers benefitting greatly from this undertaking. As a School we also look forward to being able to host galas in 2023 and beyond. Of Great disappointment to me is the fact that we are unable to offer a Learn to swim program. This is unfortunately due to the stringent legislation governing such initiatives. In a nut shell we simply don't have the manpower and skills to be compliant in this regard.

Earlier in the year the SGB resolved to officially recognise learners for their sporting achievements outside of school sport. These awards were

handed out to leaners at a special assembly on the 11th of November 2022. It was truly great to see the number of our Preppies that take part in various additional sports. I would like to encourage parents to please communicate with the school should your child take part in additional sports. We are interested in their achievements so please keep us informed.

I'd like to again commend Alet Finlaisson and her team of ladies on the Sport hospitality Subcommittee who undertook such wonderful work in presenting fantastic spreads as well as portraying such a marketable image of our school at our home sporting fixtures. Your efforts are all greatly appreciated. I'd also like to thank all those parents who serve on the SGB Sports sub- committee. You provide an invaluable service in assisting with our sporting curriculum.

The fundraising committee has been hard at work this year and raised a total of R212000. It is unfortunate that the target of 265k was required to balance the budget this year. Unfortunately the Wild Karroo fundraiser ear marked as the major fundraising event had to be postponed and will take place in March next year. This resulted in a fundraising shortfall of R53000.

Despite this I'd like to extend a huge thank you to Diane Murray, Edwardine Abader and Lene van den Heever along with the rest of the awesome ladies on the Fundraising committee. They have done an outstanding job. Fundraising is a thankless task yet everyone involved has tackled the task at hand with enthusiasm, energy and vigour. It was truly inspiring being part of one such event namely Stoep tasting. I believe the stand and hospitality put on show by our fundraising team at this event not only raised funds for the school but was also an invaluable marketing platform for the school as visitors from all over the country could get a taste of what Union Schools was all about.

It is of slight concern to me that those serving the school with such selflessness, energy and vigour tend to be the same old faces. I'd like to implore all parents, particularly those who receive exemptions to make yourselves available and repay the school with at least your time in giving back.

The School finances remain a tight rope, however positive strides have been made in engaging parents and reducing our exemptions and bad debt by some small margins. I would like to commend Mrs Lene van der Heever on the enormous amount of work she put in to preparing the budget for 2023. She has done a fantastic job. It was resolved this year that for 2023 year the fundraising would not form part of balancing our budget but instead be ring fenced for capital projects that would improve the schools infrastructure.

Exciting projects we wish to undertake for 2023 entail the development and enhancement of the two open spaces on the northern and southern side of the school. Greater detail on these projects will be provided in due course once finality has been reached on the scope of works to be undertaken.

It should also be noted the enormous contribution our Corporate sponsors, Montego Pet Nutrition have made to our school. Their funding has enabled us to equip our grade 4 classes with state of the art technology as well as enable us to provide additional education supplies and accessories we would not usually be able to afford. I would like to use this opportunity to extend a huge thank you to Montego for their continued support.

The SGB, The School and the greater community suffered an enormous tragedy this year with the unfortunate passing of our Chairman, colleague and friend Dave Stern. Dave was a giant of the community. His passion for the school was unrelenting. I believe this stemmed from the fact that he was a 4th generational A-10 Old Unionite on both his Mother and fathers side of the family. His daughters Kari and Michela are the 5th Generation of Unionite passing this establishment. Dave leaves a massive void in the Union family and our aim is to keep his memory alive through our continued efforts in striving for excellence in everything we do with

When you feel great, dare to help someone else feel great too. When the day has ended, dare to feel as you've done your best.



We strive to develop, improve and maintain a happy environment for all the children in Max Kroon.



Im sure we going to see quite a few of these boys in the u9 team next year, playing hard ball cricket.


U8/U9B Cricket Report

We are very proud of our music department as we truly believe that what the pupils do and achieve in this field is a vey important part in any child's life and development.




