2. Importance of Academic Performance

- The degrees that pay the best average salaries in South Africa Staff Writer 1 March 2020 (Business Tech)
- Unemployment rate of 29.1\%
- However, as in previous surveys, there is a clear distinction between the unemployment rates across various education levels, with far more favourable conditions for those who have tertiary qualifications of some kind - and even better conditions for graduates.
- According to Stats SA, of the 6.7 million unemployed persons, $55.9 \%$ had education levels below matric, followed by those with matric at $34.7 \%$ in the fourth quarter of 2019.
- By comparison, only $1.9 \%$ of the unemployed persons were graduates while $6.8 \%$ had other tertiary qualifications as their highest level of education.
- It was also those in these latter two categories who saw growth in employment both quarter and quarter, and year on year - further showing the importance of having qualifications in South Africa.
- Best-paying degrees
- Past salary data, and commentary from countless companies, show that businesses are in desperate need for skills - and are willing to pay big salaries to secure them.
- These skill demands tend towards the more technical fields, but throughout the years of salary information being disseminated in the public domain, engineering and finance jobs typically rank as some of the best-paid in the country.

- Bachelor's Degree Study
- Applicants need to pass a minimum of 4 subjects at a rating of 4 (Adequate Achievement, \(50-59 \%\) ) or better from a designated list of subjects.
- Calculating Admissions Points Score (APS)
- The percentages achieved in National Senior Certificate examinations (preliminary and final examinations) will be allocated an admission score equal to that percentage.
- The sum of 6 subjects, excluding Life Orientation, but including English and any required subject(s) for the relevant programme, is considered when deciding on admission. For example, for a given programme where Maths and Physical Sciences are required, we will take scores for English, Maths, Physical Sciences and the next best 3 subjects other than Life Orientation to compute the NSC score towards the APS.
- Results below \(40 \%\) for any subject do not attract a score.

\section*{UWC}
- General Admission CriteriaMinimum NSC subject requirements. All candidates must have a NSC with Bachelor's, English at level 4, another Ianguage at level 3 with the programme specific requirements.
- UWC POINTS SYSTEM
- For admission to degree programme, UWC will use a weighted system for calculating points. In order to be admitted to degree studies, the candidate should have attained a minimum of 33 points - BPharm 38 points.
- In addition to the general criteria for admission, additional criteria must be met to qualify for admission to particular study programme.

\section*{UFS}

Education:
- AP of 30+ and a minimum achievement Level 4 (50\%) for language of instruction
- Note: Additional admission requirements apply for the following disciplines: Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Computer Information Systems, Economics, Geography, Mathematics, Music, and Sesotho
- Selection of all candidates is based on the following:
- (a) Admission mark (TP)*; (Minimum of 36)
- (b) Academic mark (AP)*;
- (c) Sciences mark (WP)*;
- (d) NBT tests and if necessary any other approved questionnaires and tests; (NBT tests only a recommendation for senior students) (e) Selection mark (KP)*; and
- (f) Language of instruction (LP)*.

- ADMISSION AND SELECTION REQUIREMENTS
- Also note Stellenbosch University has a brand new Admissions Policy. Please familiarise yourself with the content.

To study at Stellenbosch University you are required to:
- South African school system: Have obtained a National Senior Certificate (NSC) as certified by Umalusi with admission to Bachelor's degree studies, which means that you must obtain a mark of at least \(50 \%\) in each of four school subjects.
- Have written the National Benchmark Tests (NBTs). Please note that when you apply for a programme in the faculty of Law and of Medicine and Health Sciences, the NBT's need to be written before 30 June if you want to be considered for selection.
- Also meet further requirements specific to the programme(s) of your choice as set out in the programme outlines under the various faculties

\section*{NMU}
-Any recognised 20-credit NSC subject combinations (dependant on school capacity) can be used towards applying for degree studies (this excludes LO which is 10 -credits), provided that each of these four subjects are also passed on a level 4 (50-59\%) or higher.
