ongratulations to the Class of 2022, who achieved a 96.6% pass rate, with 57 of 59 learners passing the NSC examination. While disappointed that we did not achieve a 100% pass rate, we were delighted in the overall excellent performance of our learners. A special word of congratulations to our top candidate, Matthew Basson on achieving seven subject distinctions and an average of 85,43%. Matthew was also awarded the Rupert Achievement Award for being the Top Matric in Graaff-Reinet for 2022. Congratulations must also go to the remaining top-ten achievers: Grace Merifield (five distinctions and an average of 83,14%); Kendall Krige (five distinctions and an average of 82,57%); Marli Brummer (4 distinctions and an average of 80,14%); Amber Binney (4 distinctions and an average of 79,25%); Tamsin James (4 distinctions and an average of 78,29%); Matthew McNaughton (1 distinction and an average of 73,71%); Kathryn Odendaal (2 distinctions and an average of

73,14%); Michelle Doyle (2 distinctions and an average of 72,82%) and Chloe Shires (1 distinction and an average of 71,86%). Thirty-nine (66%) of the learners qualified for Bachelor Studies, while eighteen (31%) qualified for Diploma studies. A total of 56 subject distinctions were obtained.

One support vehicle was packed up at 2am to ensure that it got across the river with the possibility of flooding. The decision was made to evacuate early the following morning.

And then the fun began. This day required much grit, determination and endurance from the Grade 10s and support team. Wet tents were packed up and the journey back to Riverdene under inclement conditions began. Everyone was drenched. The tracks took on the consistency of peanut butter which stuck to the bottom of boots and rendered the roads a slippery mess. The backup vehicles used winches to get across the rivers which were now soaking sand and mud, another vehicle slid off the road and nearly rolled into the river. While some adults stayed to attempt to get the vehicle unstuck, others had to continue with the learners as we feared the rivers coming down and being stuck on the wrong side. There is no reception in the canyon, so as we arrived at the farmhouse, messages were dispatched for rescue. Taking shelter in a garage, the freezing, wet group cheerfully got their stoves going and began to eat 2 minute noodles to keep warm from the inside. Spirits were never dampened.



TIME FLIES

CAITRIN SPENCE – FIRST PLACE IN NATIONAL FINAL OF SALA PUBLIC SPEAKING COMPETITION GRADE 12 DIVISION

TRI THE KAROO

he inaugural Tri The Karoo triathlon - a new fundraiser hosted by the Union Schools on Saturday, 14 October - provided a great day out in the Karoo for all competitors and is poised to grow into a huge event. The aim of the Tri The Karoo is to not only enable access to these types of events to more people in the region, but also to provide something that has fallen off the calendar in the Karoo in recent years – a mass participation swim, bike, run (and walk) platform for athletes of all fitness and skill levels.

UPS SGB Chairman's Report

The SGB represents the voice of the parent body and is ultimately responsible for the Governance of the school through its mandate to dictate policy and oversee the multitude of facets making up the School in its entirety.

The 2023 school year has been a challenging one for the Union Preparatory School Governing Body in that a significant breakdown of trust occurred between the SGB and the Principal Mrs Botha.

The Principal is charged with the professional management of the school under the authority of the Head of Department of the Department of Education in the Eastern Cape. The Principal is required to strictly carry out their functions in accordance with Section 16A of the South African Schools act 84 of 1996. Failure to do so would amount to misconduct and in some instances serious misconduct as listed in Section 17 and 18 of the Employment of Educator's act 76 of 1998.

The SGB was compelled to bring an Application in the High Court to address these issues and after extensive correspondence and engagement with the DOE, the matter was settled. The DOE resolved to second Mrs Botha to the District Office for the remainder of her term. The SGB perceived this to be the most workable solution at the time, as it would allow the School to continue in its discharge of its mandate, to provide quality teaching and learning in a safe and healthy environment, without distractions and further issues arising that may compromise this.

Mrs Heunis Jones, in her capacity as HOD, stepped up and took the reins as acting Principal. We are extremely grateful for her commitment and dedication in fulfilling this role on a temporary basis!

Despite the unfortunate occurrences that transpired the Governing

body continued to carry out its functions, particularly with the fundraising committee, headed by Diane Murray, doing fantastic work throughout the year. The fundraising committee targeted three major events namely, Wild Karroo, Stoep tasting and the inaugural Tri the Karroo triathlon event. A total of R347 473 was raised by the fundraising team which has allowed the SGB to commence with the following projects:

- The purchasing of a generator to mitigate load shedding and allow teaching and learning to continue as normal specifically through the darker winter months.
- The three grade 1 classrooms were equipped with brand new air conditioners. This was done towards the end of the winter months.
 I am led to believe that they are already making a notable difference for our little ones as the season heats up in the last term.
- The construction of the new mini AstroTurf on the front field at UPS as well as a multicourt on the old "playscape", located on the north western side of the campus. These exciting projects are funded by the UHS Development Trust of which we are extremely grateful! This however is ultimately made possible due to the continued fundraising efforts, held over the past few years (including this year) whereby a positive balance has accrued in the UPS ledger of The UHS Development Trust. This accrued amount has contributed to half of the cost of the project. The other half of the project cost will be advanced to the Governing body as a loan and paid back through fundraising efforts over the next few years.

The inaugural Tri the Karroo triathlon event kicked off on the 14th October and was a huge success. I am very excited about this event gaining substantial traction

moving forward and am extremely optimistic of it turning into a massive fundraiser for the Union Schools in the years to come. I'd like to extend my gratitude and appreciation to Kat Ott for her dedication and sacrifice in putting this event together along with all those who assisted and supported her.

Other exciting projects which the Governing Body has embarked on is the open space development around the school. The ability to take on such projects is largely due to the financial generosity and support of our corporate sponsors Montego Pet Nutrition, whose interest in our school is greatly valued and appreciated. The first phase of this project entailed building a covered walkway, on the northern side of the tuckshop building, where the third grade 2 class is located. Three shaded structures are also due to be erected over the outdoor spaces on the western side of the grade 1 classes. These should be completed by the end of the year.

The next phase of this project will entail equipping these areas with infrastructure so as to create beautiful outdoor classrooms that can be utilized for a range of different purposes.

Going hand in hand with the open space development is to plant and establish grass in the open areas in front of the grade 4 classrooms, the open area on the northern side of the tuckshop building as well as re-establish any bare areas on the main rugby field.

The plan involved removing the grass from the front field, prior to the construction of the Mini Astro being carried out, and utilising it in the areas that needed grassing. The project turned into a big one, however, with the support of various parents along with the enthusiasm and fortitude of Mr Kingwill and his ground staff, it was achieved. I'd like to extend a huge thank you to Graham and Brenda Murray as well as Wayne and Diane Murray who assisted with providing labour. A massive thank you also needs to be extended to Campbell Scott from Tyremart who provided a TLB machine and operator for two days (at no charge to the school) to assist in completing this project.

All the development that has taken place at UPS over the past year requires someone to oversee and ensure projects are done correctly, as planned and within budget. Donovan Burger has overseen all of the above and I wish to extend my gratitude and thanks to him for the hard work, dedication and time he has given in ensuring all the projects taken on are managed accordingly.

Our post provisioning for 2023 consisted of 7 departmental posts. This included the Principal, HOD for foundation phase as well as 5 educator posts. Our SGB posts on the academic side included eleven

posts comprising of eight educators and three support educators. We employed three new educators throughout the year namely Ms Williams as the new Grade 2 educator, Mrs King as the new grade 3 educator as well as Mrs Van Rooyen who was appointed to manage the learner support centre for the remaining part of the year. Mrs Kotzé has been transferred to the Learner support centre as of the 2024 school year and we look forward to her taking this

department to new heights.

Ms Williams resigned at the end of the third term, however the Governing body has recently appointed Ms van der Merwe and Ms Nortje who will take up posts as the new foundation phase educators for 2024.

The SGB has also embarked on the process of fulfilling our vacant Principal post and hope to have a new Principal appointed and ready to start at the beginning of the school year in 2024.

I would like to express my sincere gratitude and appreciation to all our educators and assistant educators for the hard work and dedication you have all put into our children throughout the year. You are all greatly valued and appreciated.

I'd also like to extend a huge thank you to our support staff who are all employed by the SGB. This includes our secretary Mrs Greyling and General workers Mr Kitchu, Mr Mafeking, Mrs Willemsem and Mrs Makonie. You all deliver such essential behind the scenes work and without you the school would be struggling to function.



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



n Friday morning, May 26, our Grade 4 general knowledge boffins represented their respective Houses in Union Preparatory School's annual Interhouse Ouiz.




